Questions, Answers and Hints:

1. Does Bambang live in a large city, or a small village? Answer: In a village.

Hints/Clues: Bambang and his friends went to the neighboring village to join the soccer match and watched the parade organized by several villages.

- 2. Why did Bambang go to his neighbor's place to watch the broadcast? Answer: Because he didn't have a TV at home. Hints/Clues: The people who live in a small village in Indonesia generally have little to no electronic devices.
- 3. Did Bambang and his friend win any contest? Answer: Yes (or maybe), the Panjat Pinang contest (or the tree climbing contest). Hints/Clues: Bambang and his friends managed to be the first few to reach the top.
- 4. Why did the people celebrate *Tujuhbelasan* and show their different backgrounds with different clothing?

Answer: To show their solidarity.

Hints/Clues: Despite being from various backgrounds, they come together to celebrate Tujuhbelasan.

5. Why do Indonesians celebrate *Tujuhbelasan*?

Answer: Because they were freed from the oppression in the past/colonialization (or to remember those who sacrificed themselves for freedom).

Hints/Clues: Some people sacrificed themselves to free the people from the colonials.

6. Is Independence Day celebrated only on the 17th?

Answer: No. It is celebrated before and after the 17th.

Hints/Clues: Bambang and his friends played in a soccer match, watched the national broadcast, and joined the Panjat Pinang contest the next day, then joined the parade the following day.
